Morefield Campground Rules and Regulations

Keep all coolers, food items (sweetened drinks included) and cooking utensils locked away in your vehicle or recreational vehicle when they are not in use. Do not store food in your tent. This is for your protection and protection of the wildlife.

Feeding or petting wildlife is prohibited.

Remember, these are wild animals!

Keep all tents on designated graveled pads only.

Place tents near table, not on grass or in wooded areas. No more than two tents per campsite are permitted, if the site can accommodate them. Do not dig trenches around tents, this will scar the ground.

No more than two cars or four motorcycles

per campsite are permitted, provided they can be parked at the site without obstruction traffic. No more than one vehicle/unit may hookup to utilities in a hookup site.

Fires are permitted only in designated fire grates.

Please do not collect or cut firewood, bundles are available for purchase at the camp store. Help protect our native vegetation, including wildflowers, by not picking or damaging them.

All pets must be kept on a leash or under physical restraint at all times.

Pets are not permitted in most trails. Please look in the park newspaper to see which trails pets are allowed on. Please dispose of pet waste properly.

Please do not wash at water source. All wastewater must be contained properly. Sinks and dump stations are available for disposal purposes.

Back country hiking in Mesa Verde is restricted. No mountain bikes or motorized vehicles allowed on trails. Stay on designated trails. Please review the trail information.

Report all fires, accidents and other emergencies to a ranger or by calling 911.

The possessing, destruction, injury, defacement, removal, or disturbance of any Park resource is strictly prohibited and against federal law.

Resources include objects of antiquity, buildings, signs, equipment, rocks, plants, wildlife, and all other natural features.

Quiet hours are 10:00 pm to 6:00 am.

Generator hours are 7:00–9:00 am, 12:00–2:00 pm, 5:00–7:00 pm.

Visit the Cliff Dwellings

The Mesa Verde Dwellings are some of the most notable and best-preserved archeological sites in the North American Continent. Sometime during the late 1190s, after primarily living on the mesa top for 600 years, many Ancestral Puebloans began living in pueblos they built beneath the overhanging cliffs. The structures ranged in size from one-room storage units to villages of more than 150 rooms. Cliff dwelling tours vary from independent self-guided tours to ranger-led walking tours.
