
The support and dedication of our Alumni is a key part of Camp’s continued success.

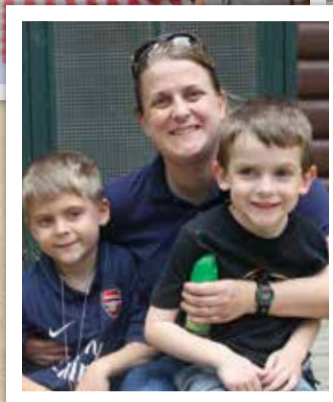

Camp is not something that everyone gets to experience in his or her life. I had only been to Girl Scout camp growing up, and when I came to Camp Lake Hubert, I had no idea what to expect. I was throwing myself into a completely different universe that was something I can barely explain to my friends here at home. All I can say is that camp was an experience that changed me completely, and in the best way possible! I was able to realize what I wanted to do with my life, met some of my best friends, and I changed and grew from day one to day 90. It is truly an experience that from the outside looking in you can never understand, and from the inside looking out you can never explain - but I am going to do my best to try.

When I walked up and was introduced to the most boisterous, loud, and outgoing people I had ever met, I never would have guessed how close we would all become. The staff members I met on my first day at Camp Lake Hubert have turned into the best friends that I look to during my most helpless moments. They are the ones who comment on every picture on my Facebook, and send me links to blogs with titles like “Camp Counselor Problems” and “Only at Summer Camp” when I am feeling camp sick. They are the ones who held my hand when times got tough, and the ones who encouraged me to push myself all summer long! These people that I lived with for three months are truly going to be my life-long friends, and I never imagined I would come home with such an amazing gift.

I thought the staff members were some of the best people I had ever met – until I met the kids who came to Camp Lincoln and Camp Lake Hubert. The kids who go to these camps are the most amazing bunch of kids. Some of them are in their first year, some are in their ninth, and some are legacies that followed in their parent’s footsteps by coming to camp. It is hard to describe how much they changed me, but I learned more lessons from those kids than any other experience I had at camp. These kids take risks, and are constantly venturing outside of their comfort zones. They pick activities like Windsurfing,

Climbing Wall, and Riflery – things that are scary even for me! The best feeling is getting to be next to them when they conquer that initial fear, and end up discovering a skill they never knew they had. The feeling I got when I was belaying one of them as they made it to the top of

the Climbing Wall, after telling me that they have always been afraid of heights, was something that I will never forget. They are articulate and communicate better than most adults I have met, and taught me so much more than they will ever realize.

Those kids pushed me to be the person that I am now, and helped me realize that I want to work with kids just like them for the rest of my life. They taught me how to communicate with them and at times, told me exactly how a camp counselor should act! They encouraged me to try things with them, and because they looked up to me, I became the person I always wanted to be. Even during the tough moments, I took those lessons with me, and every child I work with now I think about what I learned from my experience at camp. I try to be that person who helps them to grow, to form quality relationships and friendships, to be a member of their community, to highly regard excellence while still having fun the whole time! I will always stay true to the values I learned at camp, and I know I will take Camp Lake Hubert with me wherever I go in life.

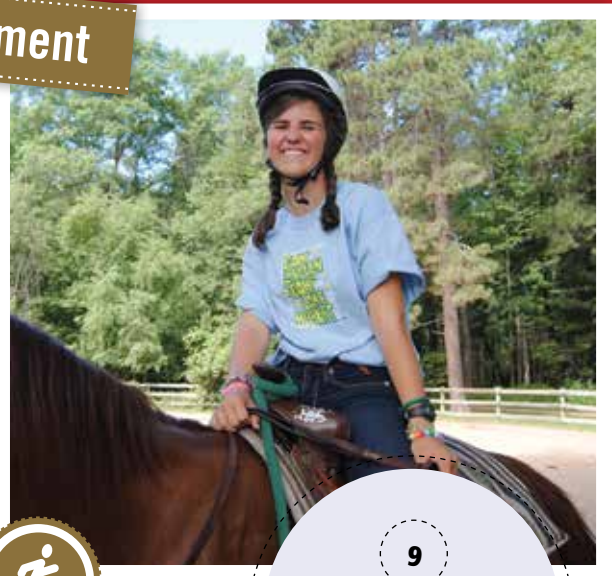

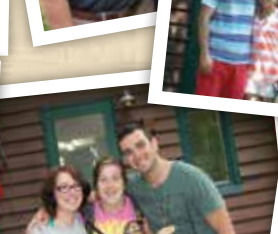
