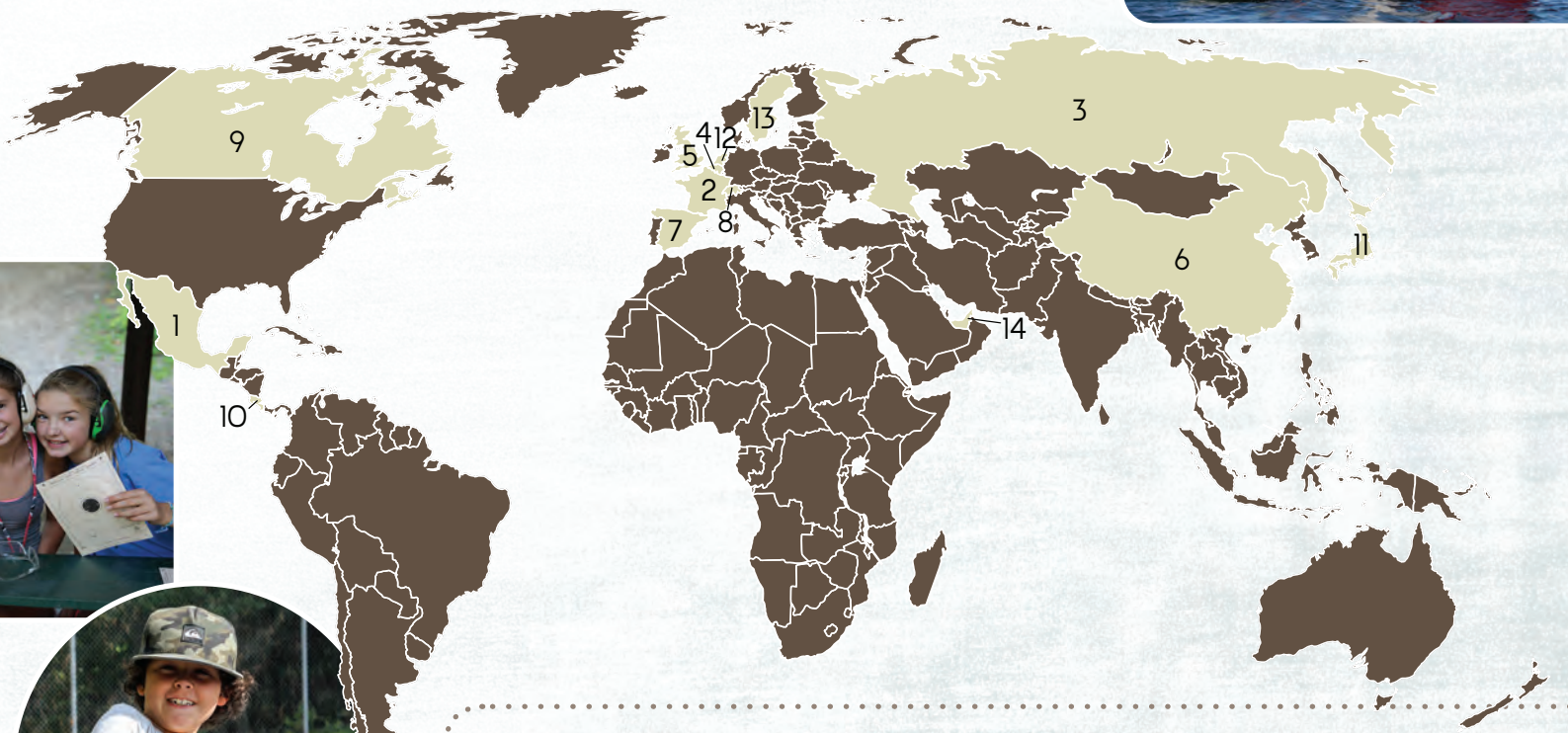
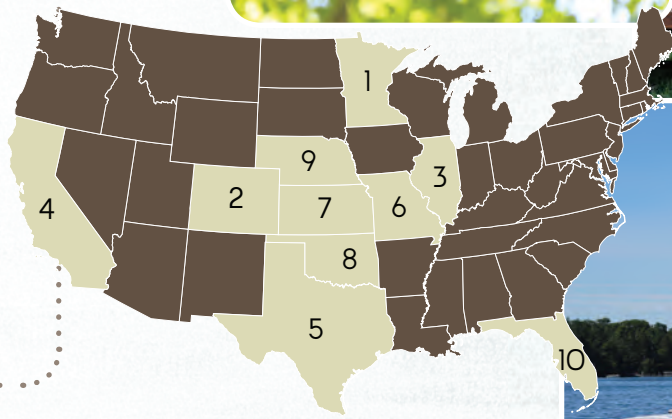

CAMP LAKE HUBERT

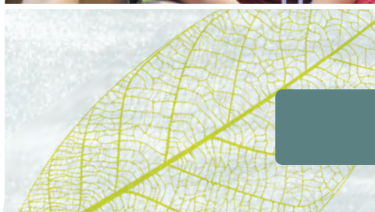

In the fall of 2015 after a summer that seemed to drag on and on as I anticipated the coming year of college, I started to think about what I wanted to do with my next summer. I inevitably reminisced about my favorite summers as a kid. Warm sunny days outside spent with great friends filled me with happiness and nostalgia. I was lucky enough to spend many of my summers as a camper at Camp Lincoln, and though the prospect of spending yet another carefree summer enjoying the outdoors with friends was momentarily alluring, I knew I wanted to do something fulfilling and have experiences that would push me to grow in new ways. 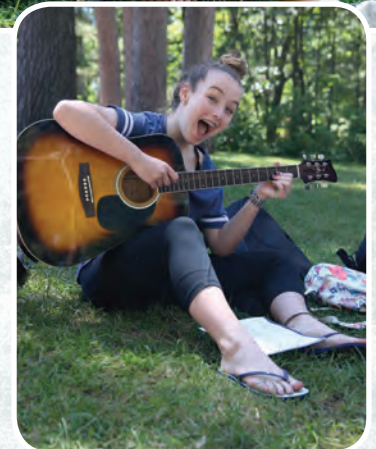

Started in 1981, as a memorial for long-time director, Chuck Everett, Sr., the Camp Lincoln/Camp Lake Hubert Scholarship Program makes it possible for a broader diversity and spectrum of children from all walks of life to experience this "world of good." What a wonderful opportunity to make this happen!

Each year, alumni and camp friends contribute to the fund, which supports a growing number of families who want their children to experience "camp." Donations are tax deductible through the American Camp Association, a 501(c)(3) organization, and Camp Lincoln and Camp Lake Hubert's 100% match on all donations, thus increasing the opportunity for more children to join our camp community.

This summer, the Campership Committee awarded 36 campers with financial support ranging from partial to full tuition support. Our recipients included 15 boys and 21 girls, hailing from Colorado, Illinois, Iowa, Kansas, Minnesota, Missouri and Texas. What a blessing indeed.
