I came home and first thing I did was research USA Summer Camps online. Eventually, after many sleepless nights, I found a company called Camp Leaders, that would sponsor my visa to America, and registered there as a first-time counselor for Summer 2017. Everything went so quickly; English Interview, filling out my online profile, and then the job fair was here. I interviewed with Chris McNeely, the Instructional Coordinator, and after that I knew I would spend Summer 2017 at Camp Lake Hubert in Minnesota. I was so excited! Three months left to organize a J-1 Visa, flights, insurance, etc.

It came so quickly, the 25th of May and my departure to the United States of America. There is no way back, I thought to myself. As a great start, my flight connection in Amsterdam was delayed by six hours, and I arrived in Minneapolis on one of the last flights of the day. After a day of traveling, I was glad to be greeted by a carefully made bed and was excited about the days to follow. It was strange and, at the same time, awesome meeting new people from all around the world at one camp. Before the campers arrived, our daily schedule consisted of making new friends among staff and getting to know the camp life, among other things. I experienced personal growth and development in lifeguard certification and the waterskiing training courses. As Waterskiing Directors, myself and Catherine Bartzen had to get all the activities and equipment ready for the first session. What is happening tomorrow, they asked us on June 13th? "The campers are coming!" the whole staff screamed in Senior Lodge.

As the weeks passed, I got to know more campers, spending all my time either on the waterski boat or in my cabin. Living in the cabin with the junior and 2-week campers was a fantastic experience too. Playing games together, chatting, reading bedtime stories, making sure everybody was having fun and was safe, and more responsibilities. This is all a part of the counselor lifestyle. During camp, all waterskiing activities were full, so our crew was busy. There was always a great variety of age

groups and different skills; at least one or two campers per block had never waterskied before. It was great seeing the campers enjoying themselves and learning new skills, while also supporting and encouraging each other. Many of them were interested in waterskiing awards. They had to push their limits and accept new challenges. This is what camp is all about, accepting new challenges, because we can overcome any obstacles at Camp Lake Hubert. All the campers achieved massive personal growth and development this summer, and I am proud of everybody who signed up for and attended waterskiing.

As the last day of camp quickly approached, it made me think about how amazing this summer was. Being an activity director or counselor is hard work, do not get me wrong. But the opportunity to accept new challenges and try new activities gave me great personal growth and development opportunities. I was able to improve my social and language skills, which included meeting international people, participating in teamwork, and working and living with kids. Camp Lake Hubert is a strong community and everybody has a positive attitude. It was like living in a forest in a big, beautiful bubble. Singing the camp songs and playing games with the campers makes you feel included and a part of this massive family. I have made many good friends from around the world. You know it is a good, quality relationship if they visit you two months after camp. But the most important part of my summer was having FUN! Ninety days might be a long period of time, but not if you are having fun. Time flies so quickly when you enjoy yourself and your activities.

Overall, I must admit that Summer 2017 was one of the best summers ever. I would like to come to the shores of Lake Hubert once more and be a part of this family again!

Camp Lake Hubert for Girls has become my favorite place on the planet and my home. The shores of Lake Hubert introduced me to sailing, high ropes, and candle making. I have met the most amazing women and had the best experiences of my life. During the past two summers at Camp Lake Hubert, I had the honor of participating in the Leadership Training Program and completing both Phase One and Two. This program accepts twenty girls every session, twelve in Phase One, and eight in Phase Two. Those in Phase One have requirements in specific activity groups, and two special projects that must be completed for them to return and complete Phase Two. Phase Two Girls have fewer activity requirements and live in cabins assuming a counselor-like position. I had the honor of completing both of these phases over the Summers of 2016 and 2017.

Summer 2016 was one of the best of my life. I was doing something I dreamed of since I was 12, with my best friends in the world by my side. All of the requirements I received were in activities that I loved. High Ropes was the activity I was most involved in, where I got to help girls overcome their fears and fly through the treetops while doing the same. Learning to sail was not as easy; I fell in the lake every day, but I did not care. Helping with all camp activities, getting closer to my friends, and growing as a leader made that summer unforgettable. Then the last night came. We all cried and said our goodbyes and see-you-next-summer. October rolled around two long months later, and in came the next round of Leadership Training Applications.

The applications have a few questions about your plans for the next summer and twelve essay questions with set word counts. The questions are very generic, asking things like what is the best part of Phase One? Would you change anything? Soon I felt overwhelmed; a summer with my best friends in my favorite place was on the line. I felt like none of my answers were good enough, that I had not lived up to my potential the previous summer, and that my dream would be lost. I finished the application two days before the due date. Two months went by and it was time for the verdict. Two days before the lucky eight were announced, I got a call from my mom in the middle of the day; she talked using the

"voice." She told me that I would not be able to return to Camp Lake Hubert unless I switched sessions. I cried and cried because I would not be able to spend my last summer with the girls I had grown up with. My options were to return as a stranger to the place I called home or to forget home altogether. I called my best friend, a girl I had met at camp my first summer, told her the news, and asked what I should do. She told me that she would drop out and give me her place, but I told her no. A girl named Annie knew a few of the First Session Girls and put me in contact with them. I was petrified, but I called the Camp Director and told her to sign me up.

The next few months I was terrified. I was put into group chats with strangers who asked who I was, how long I had been going to camp, and why I was switching sessions. These were some of the simplest yet most difficult questions to answer. As the days drew closer and closer to my departure on June 13th, my phone would buzz with questions about outfits for special days or what cabin stays everyone wanted. When the day had finally arrived, I dragged my two duffel bags to the airport and boarded a plane that would make an unplanned stop in Phoenix because something minor broke. I took this as a sign and broke down in the airport, calling every trusted friend in my contacts. They all said I was being dramatic, that everything was fine, and that it would be the best summer of my life. Every single one of them was correct.

Once I landed at the Minneapolis-Saint Paul International Airport, I took a deep breath and went down the escalator. Waiting at the bottom, I found a group of six girls sitting on their duffel bags making friendship bracelets. I sheepishly walked over, introduced myself, and was soon being hugged and welcomed from every direction. I breathed a sigh of relief and knew everything was going to turn out fine. The three-hour drive up to Nisswa went by in a flash and we were welcomed home at nine. We all stayed up bonding late into the night as we unpacked into our cubbies and made our beds.

We began the session the following day, welcoming girls and assuring parents that their daughters would have the best summer ever. The rest happened in a fantastic blur. I met all of my requirements in fishing and jumped in the lake. I helped several homesick girls see the beauty around them and miss home a little less. I was the Assistant Director for the camp play, Matilda. I worked with girls of all ages and watched them blossom into Hubert Girls. I was welcomed into the new group of girls, returning staff welcomed me with open arms, and those new to Camp Lake Hubert held my hand on the way.

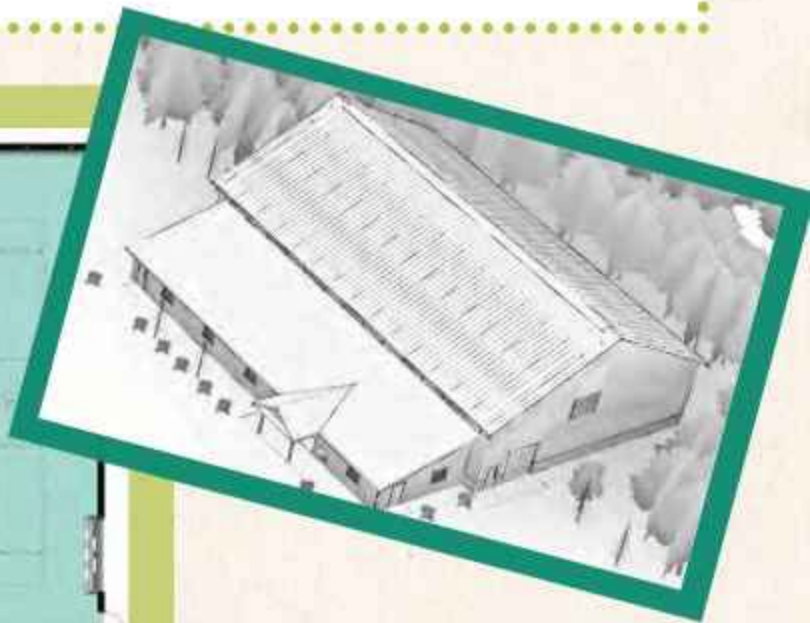
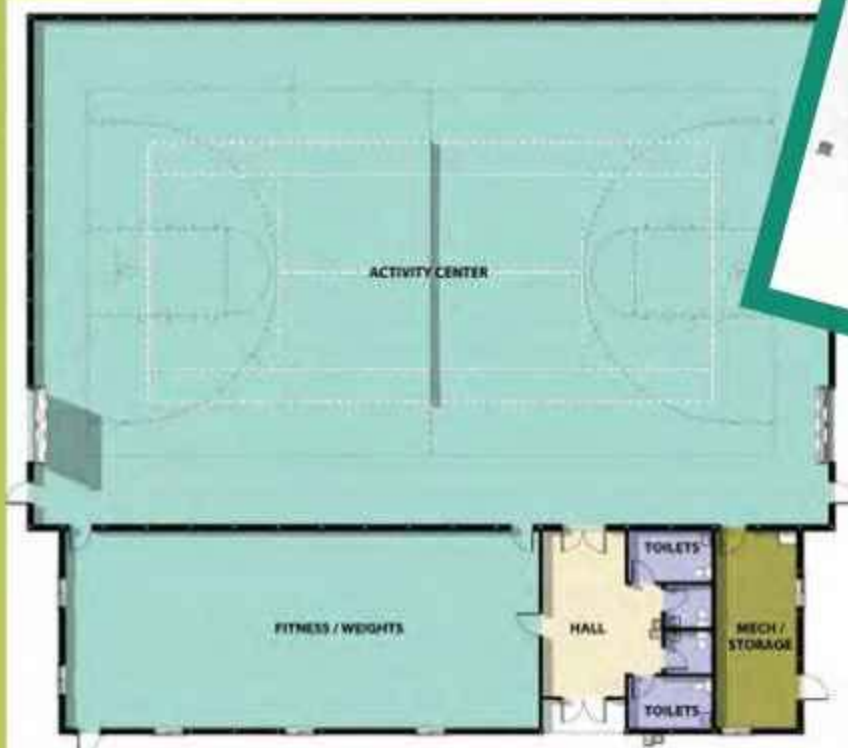

Year after year, our alumni choose to bring their families to Family Camp. Our first of 11 summers at Family Camp was in 1988. My husband Mark and I loved this special week with our kids, who looked forward to it more than any other family vacation we ever took during those years.

In 2007, we returned to Family Camp with our adult children, a spouse, and a fiancée for a camp reunion with dear friends that we had met at Family Camp in 1989. CFAB-Camp Friends Are Best- as the saying goes! That summer, I had the vision of returning with grandchildren someday. This summer was the third year we have enjoyed a truly wonderful experience at Family Camp with our four oldest grandsons, Wheeler (9), Tate (7), Teddy (6), and Henry (4). Many things about camp never change - the cry of the loons, the spectacular sunrises, the beauty of campfires, the clanging of the sailboat halyards, the smell of the pines, the sound of children laughing, the dining room filled with singing, and the importance of rest hour, especially for grandparents in charge of four young boys!

Our grandsons have learned to walk back to our cabin in the dark without a flashlight and have crept out onto the sailing dock at night to marvel at the starry sky. We have watched them take risks, learn new skills, and gain more self-confidence.
